Grace has been an executive member of Central Collegiate Institute's Student Leadership Council since 2022. She is most passionate about dance, spending most of her time practicing and finding ways to share her passion with others. Recently, she represented Canada at the Dance World Cup held in Burgos, Spain, where she was the only dancer from Saskatchewan on the team. Grace also volunteers with her dance studio and contributes to a variety of community organizations, including the Saskatchewan Festival of Words, Moose Jaw Festival of Dance, Moose Jaw Minor Hockey and more. Grace is excited to collaborate with other students and help make positive changes to school experiences across Saskatchewan!

In the 2025 football season, Central Collegiate's **Keaton Belsher** delivered an outstanding all-around performance, recording 25 receptions for 766 yards and 14 touchdowns. In addition to his dominance as a receiver, he showcased his versatility by throwing two passing touchdowns and contributing on defense with four interceptions, two of which he returned for touchdowns.

Over the course of his career, Keaton has totaled 102 catches for 2,305 yards and 35 touchdowns in just 23 games, shattering Central's previous record of 87 receptions for 1,299 yards and surpassing the league record of 84 receptions for

1,703 yards. His explosive playmaking and consistent production have firmly established him as one of the most dynamic talents in program history.
