The Career and Work Exploration (CWEX) program is a class that provides students the opportunity to earn up to four high school credits (10, 20, A30, B30) for a combination of classroom work and hands-on learning with a business or organization in the community.

The course requires students to complete an on-the-job module ranging from 30-80 hours depending on the credit. During the in-class component, students learn about workers' rights, occupational health and safety, resumes, cover letters, among other things. Typically, students will complete those modules prior to beginning their work placements. As much as possible, students choose the business or organization where they would like to work. Teachers spend a lot of time before or after school, or at lunch hours, to secure placements. Whether it be trades, health care, agriculture, education, sports and recreation, hospitality, retail, business, or engineering, students' interests can often be matched up with a business or organization so that everyone can benefit.

At the start of the placement, employers complete a job interview and an evaluation, along with a couple of performance evaluations during the placement. All of these become part of students' marks. Teachers are also required to visit the work site during the placements to monitor student progress and ensure things are running smoothly.



There are numerous advantages of the program for students. They get real-life experience doing real work at a real business. For some students, CWEX is one of the things keeping them in school. Students with special needs are great candidates for CWEX, because they can acquire specific job skills that are often best learned on the job. Perhaps the greatest benefit is that students get to try out a job to see if that kind of work is something they would like to do. For some, CWEX can be the gateway to an apprenticeship in a skilled trade, or a part-time job. Nearly all students learn transferrable skills they can take anywhere to any job. take anywhere to any job. They also develop employable attitudes and work habits, apply skills and knowledge in real work situations, and if all goes well, most get a great job reference.

Many businesses are looking for employees, and they can test out potential employees who may be hired after the work placement is finished. Numerous students each year are hired by the business where they did their work placement, or they acquire skills that allow them to be hired elsewhere. Schools benefit by building relationships with businesses and communities in general and by keeping up to date on current business trends.

"This has been the best experience because I was able to meet new people and face the challenges of a new and different workplace. This experience pushed me to know, with certainty, that I want to pursue becoming an ag mechanic. I have just signed a job offer to work part time while I finish school. After I graduate, I will begin my apprenticeship."

"At the beginning of the year, although I had some idea of what we wanted to do, I wasn't 100% sure. My CWEX experience allowed me to see, firsthand, what power engineering was all about. I have been accepted to Medicine Hat College for Power Engineering. After discussion with my CWEX placement supervisors, they assured me I was able to come home to do my work placements for 'the program.





If you're looking for hands-on opportunities in the great outdoors, Mortlach School is where it's at! Last year, through joint school and community involvement, we created a garden on school grounds. We hosted a "Stone Soup" event; garden produce and donations from the community made for a delicious meal that was shared throughout the school. Our garden will feed our students (literally and figuratively) for years to come!

Gym classes are outside whenever possible; you'll see our kids bike-riding and snow-shoeing around the neighborhood, canoeing and kayaking in Moose Jaw, as well as skating at the local seasonal ice rink. Additionally, our Grade 4-8 students spend time in Outdoor Education — learning about fire building and camping and playing games like Human-Tracker in the Mortlach Orchard and the Mortlach Historic Afforestation Project (a planted forest approximately 2 km from Mortlach that we affectionally call the "Tree Farm"). Last year the Grade 4-8 students put their skills to the test, camping overnight in Wakamow Park.

Inside the school, our focus is on bringing students together. We meet as Reading Buddies (older and younger children reading together), as well as weekly Clubs — mixed grade meetings to explore gaming, crochet, literature study —whatever their hearts desire! We also meet every Monday morning in the gym for announcements, yoga, joke of the day, singing and more. Mortlach School IS community.

Our senior science classes get to see science in action — whether lighting magnesium on fire, shooting lasers through paper, making elephant toothpaste, playing with static electricity, melting gummy bears with potassium or making the perfect paper airplane, science is fun at Mortlach.

You'll often find students working on their projects throughout the school, from our grown-up furniture in the foyer to our cozy/comfy library furniture, there's a space for everyone.

Imagine being in school for 78 years! Well, that is about how long our substitute teacher, Mrs. Gloria McKechnie has been in school-not even lying! Gloria will be 84 years young in February, and she still comes into Mossbank School to sub and volunteer! Gloria grew up on a farm north of Crane Valley. She attended school at Currie Country School and then finished her grade 11 and 12 at the then new Crane Valley School. She had always wanted to be a teacher, so following graduation, she attended Teacher's College in Moose Jaw (one year teacher's training in those days). She had three job offers at the end of the year and chose Spring Valley. She also taught at Centre Ridge and Ardill. She married her sweetheart Herb in 1959, and their first child, Cheryl, was born in 1961. In 1962, she had decided to "quit teaching for good" to raise a family. They later added children Gregg and Gerry to their fold. Life for Gloria and Herb consisted of doing all the things farm parents of that era did: farm, raise their children and be involved in their events, and be involved in the community, church, Sunday school, and 4-H. During this time, she also subbed at Mossbank School and took university classes whenever the right ones were offered in Moose Jaw, Assiniboia, Gravelbourg and Regina to earn her degree just in time for her to return to full time teaching at Mossbank in 1984. This was also the year their first grandchild was born! Over the years, Gloria taught every grade in the school from K to grade 12 (but not every subject). Gloria officially retired from teaching in June of 2000. Since that time, Gloria has been the most reliable sub and has even had occasional temporary contracts when we have needed her. The students don't dare disrespect Mrs. McKechnie-it would be like disrespecting your grandma! Although Gloria's life-long love, Herb, has passed on, she still has a growing family with 9 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren with one more due in June. Many people talk about being a teacher as "not just a job," but "who we are." It is a passion we really can't even explain. This is our Gloria!
