




News and General Information

FOR STUDENTS AND PARENTS:

HURRY. Remember that most of Sask. Polytechnic's programs are <u>First Qualified</u>, <u>First Admitted (FQFA)</u> which means first come, first served, when you meet the minimum requirements. For current grade 12s, for many programs, the first opportunity to apply is Sept. 1, 2023. If you wait, the course may be full. Here is an <u>application guide</u> to assist you.

- <u>Transcript Requests</u>: Grade 12 students who are applying to a post-secondary institution will need to send the institution an unofficial school transcript that lists the subjects they are taking in 2022-2023. They will also need to request that a <u>transcript from the Ministry of Education</u> be sent to that institution. There is a \$25 fee for the first five selections and \$2 per additional location in one sitting. Students should check off the following (see next) and make all requests in one sitting because it will cost \$25 each time you login and make the requests:

FOR STUDENTS AND PARENTS FROM PREVIOUS ISSUES:

- Interested in health sciences? Saskatchewan has agreements with post-secondary institutions in other provinces to reserve seats for eligible Saskatchewan residents in specific health training programs not offered here. The programs include Respiratory Therapy, Nuclear Medicine, Diagnostic Medical Sonography (Ultrasound), Occupational Therapy, Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI), Cardiovascular Perfusion, Electroneurophysiology, and Prosthetics and Orthotics are offered in Alberta and BC schools. - Unsure of what you wish to do after grade 12? Students learn a variety of skills and have experiences that prepare them for life after their gap year, whether that be the workforce or a post-secondary program.

For current grade 12s, for many programs, the first opportunity to apply is Sept. 1, 2023. If you wait, the course may be full. Here is an application guide to assist you.



- <u>External Counsellors' Update</u> is an important event for high school career counsellors. It will be held in person in Saskatoon (Oct. 3), Virtual (Oct. 4), and Regina (Oct. 5). Registration is required.
- Undecided about what to do at Sask. Poly? Check out the <u>Program Explorer</u>. It takes approximately 10 minutes to complete and provides a list of programs for students to investigate based on answers to questions about their interests, skills, natural talents and values. The results page provides a summary of pogroms which may be a good fit and lets you print, share, or get in touch with advisors for further assistance.
- The <u>Women In Trades Exploratory Events</u> are held in Saskatoon and Regina and have eight trades to try out on four weekends. Are you a young woman interested in trades and technology? Try out the variety of options at Sask. Polytech. Also, go to <u>Women in Trades and Technology</u>. to learn about the various options during the school year.
- <u>Supports for Success</u> are available to students to assist in ensuring they do well at Sask. Poly. There are welcome week events, support for new students, and numerous resources for students who may need help in all kinds of areas including wellness, how to be successful in school, career counselling, budgeting, and more.
- <u>Agriculture and Food Production</u> (Moose Jaw), <u>Culinary Arts</u> (now offered in Prince Albert, Regina, and Saskatoon) <u>Hotel and Restaurant Management</u> (now offered in Saskatoon and Regina) are three new or new programs in certain campuses.
- If you already have some post-secondary education or courses in a variety of areas, <u>Get Credit for</u> <u>What You Know</u> by checking into the <u>dual credit options here.</u>
- If you are interested in acquiring some microcredentials, check out <u>Surge Micro-credentials</u> offered by Sask. Polytechnic. These short courses include offering in business, education, technology, and entrepreneurship. What are microcredentials? These offer certification in a specific job or skill such as small business taxes, Indigenous leadership, or artificial intelligence. Additional <u>micro-credentials</u> are also available.
