Below is the format for your portfolio. You may have made a portfolio in some school subjects or for your own personal benefit. You may have a portfolio started or well underway using myBlueprint. Feel free to use material from other portfolio work that you have done. Your portfolio must contain all four sections, but some of the elements might not necessarily be things that you have done. Keep in mind that many of the items below can move around within the four categories. It is wise to move some of them around as needed to ensure that one category is not too large or too small. You must have a divider for each of the four sections, along with a table of contents. Your teacher may have other suggestions and requirements.

Many of the items below are best included in a portfolio by using a photograph or two, and a caption or description of what is occurring in the photo.

- 1. Introduction: This section includes anything that represents who you are, what you value and your plans for the future.
 - a. Current resume
 - b. Cover letter
 - c. Personal career goals/plan
 - d. Your education? Resume?
 - e. Recognition or accomplishments
- 2. Fundamental Skills: Your academic and technical skills reflect your ability to communicate, think and learn.
 - a. Current report card, school transcript, diploma, certificate
 - b. Career and technology courses
 - c. Honour or merit awards
 - d. Scholarships
 - e. Other languages spoken
 - f. Fine arts: drama, visual art, musical productions
 - g. Certifications: CPR, first aid, driver's license, WHMIS, Service Best, training, coaching, swimming, babysitting, modelling, propane transfer, Young Worker Readiness, etc.
 - h. Other training: military/cadets, achievement, leadership seminars
 - i. Computer skills: typing speed, excel spreadsheet or database skills, etc.
 - j. Writing sample: report, essay, poem, research or position paper
 - k. Art portfolio
 - I. Specific skills acquired through a club, organization, job or volunteer work

- 3. Personal Management Skills: These skills represent your own combination of attitudes and behaviours that demonstrate responsibility and adaptability.
 - a. Reference letters from present or past employers, teachers, coaches, superiors
 - b. Performance appraisals or evaluations form work or school
 - c. Memberships in clubs or organizations: e.g. sports, music, drama, dance, scouts/guides, cadets, community/church groups.
 - d. Volunteer or part-time work
 - e. Perfect attendance letters from school, work, clubs
 - f. Hobbies/interests
 - g. Recognition awards: student council executive, sports team captain, 4-H Club, leaders-in-training
 - h. Ability to maintain a student agenda/calendar
 - i. Activities requiring responsible behaviour: babysitting, handling money, operating equipment, etc.
 - j. Occupational research: career fairs, CWEX classes, job shadows, etc.
 - k. Educational research: post-secondary open houses, spend-a-day visits, etc.
- 4. Teamwork Skills: These indicate your ability to co-operate and work effectively with others in a group. Include evidence where you have demonstrated leadership, flexibility, self-discipline, and respect for the group.
 - a. Participation in a team sport, club, drama or musical production, band, choir, yearbook, student council, peer support, etc.
 - b. Description of a job, activity, or project that required a teamwork skill
 - c. Certificates or merit awards indicating teamwork skill
 - d. Team/athletic club achievements
 - e. Performance appraisal from work indicating excellent teamwork skills
 - f. Community volunteer work
 - g. Hobbies and interests associated with a group
 - h. Family responsibilities
